

ASH WEDNESDAY

This year, Ash Wednesday falls on Wednesday 26 February, and we will hold services as follows to mark this day:

7.30am at St Luke's – 'Commuter' Eucharist with Imposition of Ashes
2.30pm Christ Church School Ash Wednesday Service at Christ Church,
with Imposition of Ashes
8pm Sung Eucharist at St Luke's with Imposition of Ashes

Please do join us at any of the above services as we mark the start of Lent together.

We make the ash from palm crosses used for our Palm Sunday procession and service last year, then ashes made from these palm crosses are blessed and are used to make crosses on people's foreheads.

The custom dates back to the middle ages.

As the priest marks the cross in ash on each person's forehead, they say "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ."

The Collect

Almighty and everlasting God, who hatest nothing that thou hast made, and dost forgive the sins of all them that are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we worthily lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Information overload

A tenth-century Anglo-Saxon riddle asks the following question: 'Who am I? First I was killed by an enemy, soaked in water and dried in the sun, where I lost all my hair. After that, I was stretched out and scraped with a knife blade and smoothed. Then I was folded, and a bird's feather travelled over my surface, back and forth, leaving black marks. Finally I was bound and covered with skin, gilded, and beautifully decorated.'

The answer, of course, is a book – or, more specifically, a Bible. The riddle reminds of us a time when everything associated with writing was more time-consuming and expensive than it is today. That is true of the act of producing and preparing the vellum (500 calves were needed to produce enough vellum for a Bible), of manufacturing the ink from whatever suitable material could be sourced, and then the task of copying the text and perhaps meticulously decorating it.

My reflections are sparked by my own approaching book deadline at the end of this month. John of the Cross: Desire, Transformation and Selfhood, a book which emerged out of my PhD thesis, is being published by Oxford University Press and will probably

be finally printed early in 2021. I spent a lengthy morning after Christmas adding Oxford commas throughout the text, as per the publisher's wishes, and now face in the coming month the task of cutting another 7000 words from the manuscript to make it fit within the word limit. Thankfully for me, this kind of editing is made much simpler by computers. Yet this new ease in the production of books also means that my book will join thousands of others filling up the shelves of university libraries and other places that can afford the three-figure price tag.

'Of making many books there is no end, and much study is a weariness of the flesh', states the Teacher memorably in the Book of Ecclesiastes (Ecclesiastes 12.12). That increasing production of information at an academic level resonates with current concerns about 'screen time', and in particular with our widespread addiction to consuming information on our smartphones in the form of online news, Facebook, Instagram, TikTok and YouTube.

The Teacher's eyes would boggle at the amount of information available to us today (and I am aware of the irony of writing this



in a publication whose shelf life is only slightly longer than the average blog post). Like the printing press revolution of the fifteenth century, the sudden growth in availability of information has not yet been met by our agreement as a society about how best to flourish in this new age. Will we, like former local residents William Morris and Edward Burne-Jones, yearn for a return to physical objects whose value is found not just in its surface beauty but also in the care that has gone into its production? Will we, like the Teacher, grow weary with this world of endless information and seek the companionship and wisdom that has, if anything, become less accessible in recent decades? How might we seek not just more opinions but Truth? We have noted the challenge; we are yet to work out our solution. Loath as I am to say it, maybe there is a book in that! ☐

Supporting women in prostitution and women who have been sexually exploited in Kensington & Chelsea.

Modern slavery, trafficking and prostitution has become one of the defining issues of our times. Not known to many is that Kensington & Chelsea (along with Westminster) is estimated by police to have the highest number of women working in prostitution in the capital, exposed daily to violence, abuse and exploitation.

A common assumption is that women in prostitution could simply choose to leave or need rescuing, however the reality is far more complicated.

Financial problems, being deceived by someone they trusted, lack of opportunity, and immigration issues are some of the reasons many find themselves in situations they would never have imagined, making difficult choices and compromises simply to survive. Isolated by the stigma, many suffer alone and in silence, overwhelmed with guilt and shame, not knowing where to go or who to turn to for help.

The charity 'Rahab' was set up in 2009 by Sisters Adoratrices in response to their deep concern and compassion for those affected.

Based in Kensington and Chelsea, every week a small team of staff and volunteers visit the women where they work and sometimes live offering pastoral care and practical support.

This steady and consistent human connection is at the heart of all that the charity does. Women are offered places of safety and protection where they can freely express what they are experiencing and what they need, explore the difficult questions, and make informed choices about what works best for them in any given situation. This includes finding housing, a solicitor or a job, seeing a doctor, opening a bank account, learning new skills (including English), counselling, or just having a safe space to make new friends and have a chat. The Sisters also run a small safe house for women in crisis and women who have been trafficked, and visit women in prison and immigration removal centres.



Change is never easy and takes a long time, but over the years the Sisters have helped many women find hope and a new beginning. As the charity celebrates its 10th year helping some of the most vulnerable in our community, it would love to hear from anyone interested in finding out more and supporting their work.

Care 4 Calais

Hannah Parry, who often plays the organ at Christ Church, is travelling to Calais to volunteer with the refugee charity Care4Calais. As this goes to print she will be on her way with a car full of donations of clothes, food and camping equipment kindly given by friends and contacts to be distributed to those in need in northern France. Hannah writes:

I first volunteered in Calais in January and February 2018. The so-called jungle was dismantled in 2017, which received a lot of press coverage but I was shocked to hear that conditions are now worse but that the numbers of people still trapped there were still high. I volunteered for the charity Care4Calais. My days consisted of sorting donations in the warehouse and preparing for distribution. We always gave out the same things to as many people as we could, sometimes packs of underclothes, sometimes coats or boots. In the afternoons we'd drive the van to one

of the locations in Calais, Dunkirk or further afield, give out what we had and then make tea in the back of the van and chat with the refugees. They're stuck. Most have a legal case of claiming asylum in the UK but can't enter the country without risking their lives on trucks or boats. The stories I heard of families, smugglers, hopes, fears and the situation they now live in, were enlightened and heart-breaking. I made some wonderful friends and I'm only sad that I will be returning with little having changed.
