Exactly 200 years ago the new parish church of Chelsea, St Luke's, was almost complete. It had taken four years to build and at Christmas 1823 was having the final touches put to it. So, we stand in a long tradition of this parish church being open to telling the story again and again of the birth of Jesus Christ.

Unlike some of our larger churches, Christ Church, has a village feel to it, a family scale, surrounded by the everyday things of life - houses, our school, a pub. It was, of course amongst the ordinary people, the ordinary buildings of Bethlehem that the extraordinary was to happen 2,000 years ago.

Thousands and thousands of people will have come to our churches over the intervening 200 years to sing and hear, to enjoy Christmas fare and friendship. So welcome one and all.

The amazing fact, of course, is that while we meet each





year at this season with all its pre-Christmas excitement, what we celebrate at Christmas is not just seasonal but for every day, and has been proclaimed not just for 200 years but for over 2,000 years, that God, having created all that there is, doesn't interrupt its workings, but from within it, from the everyday, raises up a possibility of human life being different, more reflective of the divine life. Yes, God uses the ordinary things of the day - a teenager, a stable, shepherds, to allow the extraordinary to bubble up to the surface and to provide a new vision of what human life and love could be like.

Hidden Histories: Sir and Lady Dilke's Ewer

In inventorying the contents of St Luke's and Christ Church (thank you to the volunteers who have helped with this!) I have been struck by the array of objects in our churches given in memory of loved ones, from bookshelves to pavement stones.

These sometimes overlooked items can be gateways to fascinating stories of remarkable individuals. One such object is this silver ewer in regular use at St Luke's, engraved with the names 'Charles and Emily Dilke'.

Sir Charles Wentworth Dilke, 2nd Baronet (1843-1911), was a Chelsea MP and a keen supporter of the labour and feminist movements of the period. He was considered one of the most brilliant radical statesmen of his time and many believed he would be the next Prime Minister. In 1885, he became embroiled in the high-profile divorce suit of Virginia

and Thomas Crawford (MP) and his political career never recovered. His wife, Emilia Francis Strong, later Lady Dilke (1840-1904) was a brilliant writer and art historian who, like her husband, advocated for social reform. She was involved in the women's trade union movement and helped establish the first League in 1874.

Christ Church School Praised In SIAMS Report

At the start of October, Christ Church School received a two-day visit from a SIAMS inspector. The Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools' (SIAMS) framework is the way that church schools are checked and supported in the quality of their Christian ethos and teaching of RE. These are areas that Ofsted do not inspect. Under the SIAMS framework, church schools are inspected every five years.

We were delighted to see the school praised highly in the inspector's judgement. The inspector described a 'rich and innovative curriculum which is skillfully shaped to enable all pupils

to grow and develop putting togeth spiritually'. She stated that whole school. 'cohesive and supportive relationships mean that pupils and states the species of 'exceptional links with here.

An ABC of the CofE: Dioceses

We continue our series introducing some of the significant structures and concepts of the Church of England.

42: The 'Answer to the Ultimate Question of Life, the Universe and Everything'. Douglas Adams's joke in *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy* may have become a popular cult reference. But now ponder the fact that the Church of England is formed of 42 dioceses. Are these, in fact, the Answer to the Ultimate Questions?

Well, maybe. From the perspective of the pews, the diocese can easily seem like a distant entity – rearing its head when the Parish Share is due, and taking visible form only when the Bishop comes to visit. A parish such as St Luke's and Christ Church is most worshippers' main day-to-day experience of the church.


But even in the very beginnings of Christianity, with the letters of Saint Paul, we see churches finding ways to work and worship together. In the 4th century, the church adopted the language of late Roman administration, and created administrative areas called dioceses, each under the authority of a bishop.

When Augustine of Canterbury brought Christianity to England in 597, one of his first acts was to found a diocese at Canterbury. And many of the dioceses that were founded in England in the following two centuries - Rochester, London and York among them - still exist today. But they have been joined by many other dioceses. About half of the 42 dioceses in existence today - Liverpool, Southwark, Sheffield and Leicester among them - were formed in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the result of the Church of England's attempts to reorient itself to the realities of modern British industrial society. And one of the dioceses is not even in England at all the Diocese in Europe is made up of numerous Anglican chaplaincies in Europe, Morocco, Turkey, and Russia.

Today, there are various decisions of the Church of England that are made at a national level, through bodies such as General Synod, the House of Bishops, and Archbishops' Council. But a great deal of power continues to rest with dioceses – and, in particular, with their bishops. This is particularly noteworthy given the current challenges the Church of England is facing with declining numbers of worshippers. Across the country, bishops are adopting different schemes to try to make the church sustainable for the coming decades – with (to put it mildly) varying levels of success.

But dioceses also continue to exercise much of the necessary work of church administration. They provide support to parishes in matters such as children's work, safeguarding, and fundraising. They bear responsibility for the maintenance of clergy housing. They form links with other dioceses in the Anglican Communion for fellowship and mutual support. They deliver training to curates, and other forms of training and support to clergy at different stages of their ministry. Like so much administration, when it is going well it passes by unnoticed. But when it is neglected, the effect on parishes and clergy is notable.




A map of the current dioceses of the Church of England. The Province of Canterbury is shown in yellow, and the Province of York in red. Credit: Wikipedia.

Paolozzi's Oscar Wilde Statue for Dovehouse Green

Some of you may have seen the display at the back of St. Luke's recently giving some interesting facts about Sir Eduardo Paolozzi and Oscar Wilde. The statue is progressing well at the Pangolin Foundry in Stroud and has been "signed off" for the next stage of development, which is to make a wax mould from the model that should take us through to the new year and the pouring of the metal in February/March. This will be followed by the polishing and finishing patina before the proposed installation - all being well - in May 2024.

Images of the model are below. The sculpture will measure approximately 2 metres in height, 2.3 metres in length and 2 metres in depth. It will stand on a plinth 25 centimetres in height of polished concrete resembling stone.

At Taizé People Are Seeking a Simpler Life with God

For October half term this year, Father Baxter and I got to take some of our youth to Taizé, a monastery and pilgrimage site in France! We did this through our partnership with Youth Ministry in Communion, so we joined young people from other churches in Kensington. Sixteen of us got on a coach and drove through the night to get to be a part of what they're doing there.

If Taizé is new to you, it is a community that was founded by Brother Roger in the 1940s. His vision was to create a place of peace, where Protestants and Catholics alike could worship together. The music there has become famous - the songs are short, repetitive chants that are written in hundreds of languages. They are worth a Google search.



This game has been named Taizé Twister and is played on the benches where we share our meals.

The community has flourished over the years and is now a pilgrimage site for young people from all over the world. During our time there, there were about 2.000 teenagers from all over Europe. We were the only

group from the UK though, so our young people stood out with their accents!

During the week, we worshiped together, participated in Bible studies, took part in work crews, ate meals together, and had a really fun time. Stepping into the full

rhythm of Taizé means being in a work crew, so our young people cleaned bathrooms and kitchens, did the washing up and more. The leaders had a fantastic time witnessing this!

At the end of the week, we had the opportunity to meet with Brother Paolo, who's been a part of the community since the 1970s. He asked us to all share something that stood out for us during the week, or a favourite part. I was surprised to hear that the silence was a highlight to a number of our young people. Three times a day, the whole community sits in silence. The week is filled with so much, so it really touched me that silence would stand above the rest for them.

A leader asked Brother Paolo if the community has thought about becoming more modern in order to appeal to more young people and I loved his answer. He essentially said no; people crave a kind of simplicity when it comes to worshiping and connecting with God. They don't need smoke machines and flashy videos to attract young people, they're doing just fine as they are. I loved his frankness. He's right, the community was overflowing

Turkey's First Orthodox Church Built in Post

I was thrilled to be invited as a guest of Gabriel Malas of the Syrian Orthodox Church (with monasteries and churches in the Tur Abdin region of Turkey) to the prestigious opening of the first church to be built in Turkey since Ottoman times. The new St Ephrem Cathedral's land was given to the Syrian Orthodox Church by President Erdogan 10 years ago and he put the first spade in the ground for the foundations. It took three years to build and cost over US\$5 million.

The earthquake in Turkey earlier this year delayed the dedication which finally took place on 8 October, attended by many ecumenical church dignitaries from far and wide and also the Turkish President, Recep Tayyip Erdoğan, The Speaker of Turkey's Parliament, Numan Kurtulmuş, Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew I, Sahak II, Head of the Armenian Patriarchate of Turkey and Mor Philoxenos Yusuf Çetin, Patriarchal Vicar of the Syriac Orthodox Church and Metropolitan Bishop of Istanbul, Ankara and Izmir.

On Saturday 9 October, I flew from London Gatwick with Gabriel Malas and met the Archbishop of Canterbury's representative, South-Indian born, the Venerable Dr Leslie Nathaniel, who had flown in from his base in Germany. Gabriel's cousin Thomas Ozdemir met us in Istanbul and drove us to the Crowne Plaza Hotel, where Gabriel had generously given us accommodation. At 5.00am the following morning, Archbishop Evangelou arrived from Limassol,

Cyprus, where he had been conducting a wedding. Thereafter he was constantly at my side, as I found walking long distances on slippery marble floors to the restaurants challenging.

After an early lunch on Sunday, Thomas drove a robed Archbishop, the Venerable Dr Leslie Nathaniel, and me to the new cathedral where we were had a security search and were given badges with our seat numbers. We were then escorted to our seats - the Archbishop and the Venerable Dr Leslie Nathaniel in the front row, mine in the 7th row where we each found a bag containing a seal (paper-weight) of the church, a book on the origins of the Syriac Church in Turkish and English and a box of chocolates!

The event opened with songs in Aramaic sung by a charming choir of young ladies and four children. This was followed by quite a long speech in Turkish before the entrance of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, surrounded by photographers, to loud clapping. He took his seat in the front row next to His All Holiness Patriarch Bartholomew and Archbishop Philoxenos, our host for the event. He then addressed the crowd (in Turkish) from the rostrum, praising the three Abrahamic faiths and including a promise to give the cathedral more land on which to build an elementary and a secondary school and a graveyard. Much clapping followed. When he finished, Archbishop Philoxenos went to the rostrum to thank him (in Turkish).

A long line of dignitaries then went up on the stage and a long green ribbon was stretched from end to end in front of them. All participants were given a pair of scissors and at the given moment, they all cut the ribbon. The cathedral was formally declared open. We then moved to the ground floor to see the actual cathedral built of honey-coloured stone with its wonderful chandeliers. It holds 750 worshippers. After a good look round we were approached by Syriac Assyrian TV and interviewed, in English, including me, for the following day's coverage!

Archbishop Philoxenos graciously invited Gabriel Malas and me to share his car to return to his residence (about 45 minutes' drive) where he had laid on a lavish and delicious three-course supper for 50 men at three long tables. We five women were put together at the end of one table! Thomas Ozdemir eventually took us all back to the hotel.

On Monday, Archbishop Evangelou and I met representatives of Setur to confirm the arrangements for the six-day tour to commemorate the I,700 years of the Nicene Creed, which I am organising for May 2025. For those who would like details, please contact Tracy at the Parish Office and I will send more information.

Archbishop Evangelou and I flew back to Heathrow on









